

School Improvement Plan 2010-2011

All members of the GHES community worked together to implement the strategies of our School Improvement Plan. We hosted Books-A-Million Night, Camp Read-A-Lot, Science Fair Night, three math nights, and two writing nights allowing us to connect academic content with family interaction. Fifty-nine percent of our students met high standards in reading, forty-three percent met the standards in math, and eighty-six percent met the standards in writing. Unfortunately, we did not meet the criteria for Adequate Yearly Progress indicating the need to review student data with more intensity, continue to research best teaching practices, and provide staff development in these areas to accomplish these goals.
