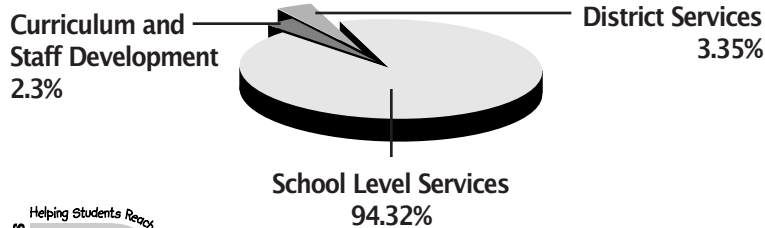

School Improvement Plan 2010-2011

We continued our emphasis on student goal setting in reading to increase their investment in their growth. Teachers reviewed FCAT and FAIR data to determine instructional areas of need. Resources from the reading program and Florida Center for Reading Research were used to address student needs. We continued our partnership with the Tampa Bay Area Writing Project to improve our writing program. Teachers participated in trainings on the math Next Generation Sunshine State Standards and effective methods for teaching the standards. Students were given pre-tests to determine error patterns and to develop mini-lessons targeting major concepts to improve achievement. We hosted three parent sessions and one Family Night, at a local grocery store, highlighting the new math standards and techniques for providing support at home. We maintained a hands-on science center with follow-up activities to demonstrate an understanding of the vocabulary and concepts presented in the center.
