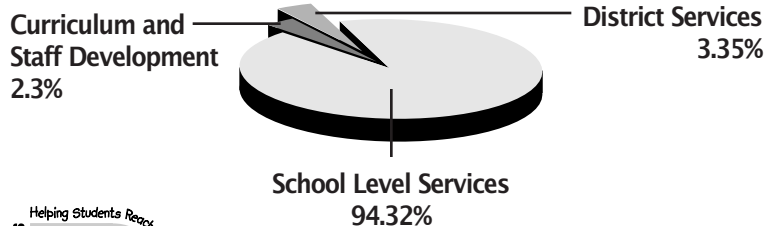

School Improvement Plan 2010-2011

The School Improvement Plan goals for the 2009-10 school year focused on reading, writing, math and science strategies. All classroom teachers participated in ongoing staff development through professional learning communities. Instructional best practices were implemented to provide a consistent learning environment. Diagnostic assessments were used to identify individual student needs. Students were provided learning opportunities based on these identified individual needs. These strategies resulted in 54 percent of our students making learning gains in reading and 56 percent of our students making learning gains in math.
